Beach Erosion Hearing on Jones Inlet Project

A hearing was held before the Civil Functions Committee of the United States Senate on July 17, 1951 on the Jones Inlet project. The purpose of the hearing was to consider enactment of legislation appropriating Federal funds for the construction of a jetty at the east end of Jones Beach and for a contract to dredge a channel through Short Beach to the ocean. The project was recommended by the Army Engineers in 1941 as the most effective method of stabilizing Jones Inlet. It is believed that the jetty from the east end of Jones Beach will have the effect of preventing any fur-ther erosion at Point Lookout. It is also believed that the channel through Short Beach will relieve the pressure now exerted by the present channel and the rush of water along the east end of Point Lookout which constantly threatens destruction of the rock wall.

If Congress enacts legislation to appropriate funds the local authori-ties, State, County, and Town, will immediately start the project which it is estimated will take between one and

two years to complete.

A delegation appeared at the Senate hearing in support of the proposed legislation for appropriations. The delegation consisted of Robert Doxsee, President of the Civic Association of Point Lookout, Hon. S. Samuel DiFalco, Harry Barrata, and Osborne A. Mc-Kegney, counsel to the Civic Association of Point Lookout. The delegation also included: Hon. Holly Patterson. Chairman of the Town obered of the Chairman of the Town oBard of the Town of Hempstead, and Hon. Leonard Hall, the Congressman in whose district Point Lookout is located.

Through the efforts of Judge Di-Falco, Hon. Herbert H. Lehman per-sonally appeared at the hearing and sponsored the legislation and requested the Senate Committee to give it favorable consideration. Hon. Irving Ives, the Senior Senator from New York, likewise appeared as he did

on a prior occasion and argued in support of the legislation.

The case was then fully and force-fully presented by Congressman Hall and seemed to obtain the approval of Hon. Kenneth McKellar, Senator from Tennessee, who is Chairman of the Committee. Whether or not the legis-lation will be passed is still problematical. The strongest hurdle to be overcome in obtaining the legislation is the present economy program which seeks to limit and curtail the expenditure of Federal funds. On the other hand, the Kansas Flood and the damage resulting therefrom which occured just prior to the hearing is a factor

which strongly supports the legisla-

Prior to attending the hearing petitions signed by approximately 1,000 property owners of Pt. Lookout were prepared and submitted to the Senate Committee by Senator Lehman. In addition, a Memorandum by cousel to the Civic Association was also submit-ted to the Senate Committee. The Memorandum recited the history of the loss of property at Point Lookout, the recent inroads of the ocean, and close approach to private property and the public streets within the last few months. The Memorandum also referred to the Kansas City flood as an example of the results of delaying necessary action too long.

The above case was tried before Judge Cortland A. Johnson, Supreme Court, Mineola, on December 14th, 1950. Summons and Complaint was served on Leonard Little by certain faction at the Point at Civic Association meeting in July, 1950, with a great deal of noise and ceremony.

Mr. Hurley, attorney, of Mineola, drew the complaint containing 5 causes of action.

The court record shows that no one representing the Civic Association or Taxpayers appeared at the trial on the above date. This fact cannot be denied. The case was tried in behalf of one Constance Hurley, not a resident of the Point, and Mr. and Mrs. M. Scolaro, residents of the Point. Little defeated 4 causes of action of complaint against him in the decision of Judge Johnson on February 23rd, 1951.

Little appealed the remaining cause of action which gave right of access to the beach to Hurley and Scolaro. No right of access was given to the Taxpayers. Therefore, no victory for them.

payers. Therefore, no victory for them.

The decision by the Appelate Division on June 26 upheld Little's contention to deny right of access to the beach over his property by the two lot owners on the ocean front. Court said, in part, Little has absolute right to any use of his beach without implication of easement to anyone. P. J. Nolan, Adel, Sneed and Wenzel, JJ., concurred. Carswell, J., dissented. A 4 to 1 decision in favor of Little on the easement.

Advance Fund Offered U.S. to Save Jones Inlet

State, Nassau, Hempstead to Lay Out \$2,420,000, Wait to be Repaid Half

New York State, Nassau County, and
the Town of Hempstead, L.I., offered
yesterday to advance \$2,420,0000 to the
rederal government to save Jones Inlet for navigation, the government to
repay its share, \$120,000, without interest when the money becomes available.

The actual offer was made to the Senate Appropriations Committee yesterday by Rep. Leonard W. Hall, R., N.Y., who lives in Oyster Bay, L.I., on authorization of a letter signed by Robert Moses, president of the Long Island State Park Commission; J. Russel Sprague, county executive of Nassau and A. Holly Patterson, presiding supervisor of the Town of Hempstead.

supervisor of the Town of Hempstead.
Jones Inlet is a shifting, treacherous body of water, leading from Great Souch Bay to Atlantic Ocean and Long Beach. For many years its currents have been shifting westward, not only making the inlet increasingly shallow and hazardous for commercial and pleasure craft mooring in the bay, but threatening eventual destruction of the Village of Point Lookout.

Beach Shrinking
Houses in that village which three
years ago were separated by a quarter
of a mile of beach from the ocean
are now only a few feet from the surf.
The land is building up on the east
side of the inlet where Coast Guardsmen at the Short Beach Coast Guard
Station now must walk across half
a mile of beach to reach their boats.

In Washington, Mr. Hall explained that local authorities first tried to enlist the help of the national government in 1940 when hearings were held by the Army Engineers to determine the advisability of constructing a breakwater, jetty and sea wall to save the inlet.

The Army Engineers approved the project in 1941, Mr. Hall said, but is was not until 1945 that it was included in the rivers and harbors bill. Last year the Senate committee on public works recommended appropriation of \$500,000 to begin the project, but this appropriation was eliminated along with many other civilian projects when the Korean War broke out.

Col. W. E. Potter, of the Army Engineers, said in Washington he hesitates to accept the advance of \$2,420,000 offered by New York, Nassau and Hempstead without a token appropriation by Congress to indicate governmental approval. With such a token appropriation, even if only \$50,000, Col. Potter said, the engineers could begin the project.

Mr. Hall said he hoped the Senate would see fit to include such an appropriation in the rivers and barbors bill this year, following the precedent it adopted last year in recommending appropriation of \$500,000. Until the Senate does so, he said, it seemed unlikely the government would accept the offer of New York, Nassau and Hempstead.
